SUPPORT CHILDRENS LANGUAGE & LITERACY THROUGHOUT THE ENVIORNMENT FROM HDLH?



- Revisit documentation with children.
- Recall and retell past events, "What did you have for dinner last night?" "What was the story about that we read yesterday?"



✓ Place familiar print materials and books in different areas to spark ideas for play and exploration – for example, cookbooks or takeout menus in the dramatic area, architectural photos in construction area.



- Encourage children and families to create their own books and stories to share with each other.
- Use written text along with visuals to promote literacy and to ensure that everyone uses the same language.



Taking literacy outdoors is a fantastic way to help children feel more relaxed, spark their imagination, and inspire them to engage in new ways.

Infants and Toddlers

- Point to & name things you are both seeing
- Sing to them
- Make up songs to signal routine changes
- Read to them
- Describe what they are doing

Preschoolers

- Talk about recent events
- Play word games
- Ask open-ended questions "What do you think will happen next?"
- Read in small groups
- Consciously use new vocabulary

School-Age

- Continue to ask questions that encourage creativity & thinking
- Read to them, with them and encourage reading
- Make up silly rhymes and songs together
- Continue to introduce new vocabulary
